100th Day of School Celebration

January 29th marked the 100th day of this school year! Pre-K, Kindergarten, and First Grade students dressed as 100-year-olds and did fun activities around the number 100. In First Grade, Ms. Finkel's and Ms. Lefever's classrooms wrote what they would do with \$100, jumped and exercised for 100 seconds, and talked about their five senses and what they would like and not like with 100 different things. Ms. Andoh's and Ms. Maraj's Pre-K class practiced counting from one to 100 using snacks like Cheerios.

Pre-K Parenting Workshop

Our Pre-K Parent Workshop focused on two essential topics that help lay the foundation for students' success: sound pronunciation and social-emotional learning (SEL). Parents learned effective strategies to support young learners in producing alphabet sounds under the Direct Instruction Program, an important skill for early literacy development that helps students master the sounds and building blocks of reading and writing.

We also introduced SEL practices and positive communication tools that empower parents to build trust and connection with their children to create an environment where emotional well-being and academic growth go hand-in-hand. Together, these strategies equip parents with the knowledge and confidence to support their child's development both inside and outside the classroom.

Scholars are working hard in our Reading, Language, and Math classes. Every day, scholars are presented with high-level content including multiplying multiple digit numbers, long division, completing novel studies, and writing evidence-based paragraphs. They work independently to display what they have learned but will also often work collaboratively to showcase and even extend their learning.

In the Temple University homeroom, students are currently competing in the READ Bowl run by former NFL player Malcom Mitchell, which is an international competition to see which class can read the most minutes. In the first week of the competition, the Temple homeroom read 26,840 minutes! In the University of Tulsa homeroom, students are working on poetry and are currently making progress in writing their own poetry as well. In Tulane University, we are gearing up to begin reading The Wizard of Oz. Keep reading, City Springs!

Guidance on Federal Immigration Enforcement in the School Context

Our Key Principles:

A. All Students, Regardless of Immigration Status, Have the Legal Right to Attend School. In Plyler v. Doe, The U.S. Supreme Court made clear that The U.S. Constitution prohibits schools from denying access to public education based on students' or their parent/guardian's immigration status.

B. City Schools Welcomes All Students. Our school will always be a welcoming space where every child—regardless of immigration status—is valued, respected, and supported. We will not take any action that might discourage students from enrolling and participating in school, or that might lead to the exclusion of students, based on immigration status.

C. City Schools Robustly Protects Student Privacy. City Schools does not require students or their families to provide information about their immigration status, and staff will not disclose any student information unless required by law.

D. City Schools Does Not Tolerate Discrimination, Harassment, Bullying, or Intimidation based on Immigration Status or for Any Other Reason.

Please rest assured that Dr. Richetta and the City Springs staff are committed to upholding these Key Principles.

On January 14, 2025, the Baltimore City Public School Board voted unanimously to renew the charters for City Springs Elementary/Middle, Frederick Elementary, and Govans Elementary.

We are delighted that City Springs received a five-year renewal! Going into the charter renewal vote, the School Board had recommended a three-year renewal. Thanks to the advocacy of City Springs' families, staff, and friends--and the amazing accomplishments of City Springs' Scholars and its exceptional school community and culture--City Springs was given a five-year renewal.
