Attendance Matters

We had 115 students come to school **EVERY DAY** for the three weeks between Thanksgiving break and winter break! This is amazing. Thank you to these scholars and their families for making sure they are in school every day ready to learn! **Our average monthly attendance rate so far this school year is 90%. Keep up the good work!**

It's Winter Assessment Time!

Our NWEA winter assessment runs from Jan. 12 through Jan. 28. These tests are important to track your child's progress and to help our educators make the necessary real-time adjustments to your child's learning groups and focus. Ongoing assessment allows us to make needed changes to a student's program during the school year, not in preparation for next fall's school year.

Tips for a great NWEA Assessment:

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast on the day of the test.
- Be positive about the assessment with your child. You are the best role model for your child! Explain that the NWEA is a tool for teachers to better understand their learning needs, not just a grade.
- Prioritize learning at home with a quiet, comfortable (screen-free) space at home for studying or reading. Read aloud together. Play word games and involve your child in everyday math (cooking, paying bills, calculating tips, etc.).
- Encourage your child to solve problems independently.




Exemplar Educator of the Month: Sojourner Truth

Born into slavery as Isabella Baumfree and after escaping to freedom, she changed her name to Sojourner Truth and became a powerful abolitionist and women's rights activist. Her famous "Ain't I a Woman?" speech at a women's rights convention demanded equal rights for Black women. Working with Frederick Douglass and others, she helped slaves escape, petitioned Congress, and worked for integration and land for freedmen after the Civil War.
