Virtual Learning Update

Because we have used our allotted three snow days, if inclement weather prohibits us from opening the school building, we will have VIRTUAL LEARNING DAYS moving forward for the remainder of this school year. We have no more snow days left.

MARK YOUR CALENDARS: The last day of school is Tuesday, June 16 for ALL students.

Every student is required to log on during a Virtual Learning Day. Here are some tips for making these days productive and successful for your student.

- Choose a quiet, well-lit area, preferably away from TVs or play areas.
- Set up/familiarize yourself with technology, log in, and check for assignments the night before.
- Keep essential supplies (pencils, headphones, paper, computer, tablet, etc.) within easy reach.
- Ensure the desk and chair are comfortable for the child.
- Minimize distractions by reducing background noise and limiting unrelated screen time during school hours.
- Incorporate short, physical "brain breaks" to help children stay focused.
- Encourage kids to use the chat, ask questions, and speak up during live sessions.
- Communicate with Teachers for support or to clarify assignments.
- Be Patient! Virtual learning requires a different set of skills for young learners.

100th Day of School

Class Spotlight: 4th Grade

Ms. Monti's 4th grade readers have been busy growing their reading muscles. In Columbia, students are learning how characters change and develop across story sets. They've been diving into characters' actions, thoughts, and feelings to understand how experiences shape who characters become over time. It's been exciting to see students make thoughtful connections and share their ideas during class discussions.

In Brown, students have been strengthening their writing using the RACES strategy to prepare for MCAP testing later this year. They are practicing how to clearly restate questions, answer fully, cite evidence, and explain their thinking with confidence. Alongside all this hard academic work, students have also been focusing on building positive relationships — showing kindness, supporting one another, and creating a classroom where everyone feels valued. We're so proud of the effort and teamwork happening each day in Ms. Monti's class!

Terrapins in the Classroom

The National Aquarium's Terrapins in the Classroom program brings Maryland students face to face with the Maryland state reptile, the diamondback terrapin.

Students care for, observe, and learn from them throughout the year. Scholars will release their diamondback into their natural habitat on Poplar Island in the Chesapeake Bay.

Diamondback terrapin facts:

- Only North American turtle species that lives exclusively in brackish, not fresh, water
- Official state reptile of Maryland
- Lives for 25-40+ years in the wild



Mr. Rollins Elected to McDaniel College's Athletic Hall of Fame

Congratulations to Mr. Rollins on his induction into McDaniel College's Athletic Hall of Fame in December 2025! Mr. Rollins and his wife, Nyjah, founded Charm City MMA where they empower Baltimore youth through martial arts and life enrichment programs. They teach martial arts to our Scholars as part of our Resource program.

A member of the Class of 2014, Joseph "J-Roll" Rollins played Football and Track & Field for McDaniel's Green Terror.

From the McDaniel website: One of the most electric student-athletes in McDaniel College history, Rollins left an indelible mark on both the football field and the track. He was a three-time All-Centennial Conference First Team selection who was named the 2013 Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Year. An All-American, he is one of just six players in program history to earn three first team all-conference selections and one of only four to earn Player of the Year honors.


He holds the program record with six yards per carry, and ranks second in program history with 4,641 rushing yards and third in rushing touchdowns. In track and field, Rollins is top-ranked in the program's top performers list in the 60-meter dash and the 55-meter dash.

Off the field, Rollins majored in Graphic Design and served as a member of Omicron Delta Kappa and as a student visitor on the McDaniel College Board of Trustees. He volunteered with the Tournament of Champions and as a mentor with the Boys & Girls Club of Westminster.



**Habit of the Month: #5 Seek First to Understand
Then to be Understood
Attribute: Empathy
Exemplar Leaders: Thurgood Marshall**

Thurgood Marshall (1908–1993) was a pioneering lawyer for the NAACP who argued 32 cases before the U.S Supreme Court, winning 29 of them, including the landmark Brown v. Board of Education (1954) that desegregated schools. Appointed in 1967 as the first Black Supreme Court Justice, he served until 1991, consistently advocating for civil rights and equality. Born in Baltimore and the son of a railroad porter and kindergarten teacher, his parents taught him to stand up for his beliefs. He attended Lincoln University and graduated first in his class from Howard University Law School after being denied entry to the University of Maryland due to segregation.
